





Hello everyone,

What an amazing term one at kindy. The children were able to participate in a number of different activities around special events. Some of the things we did:

Water Safety – we had a visit from a team member from Drowning Prevention Auckland. This is an educational programme, designed for younger children, that teaches them about being safe in and around water. They got to try on life jackets and learn how they work effectively.

Easter – wow! we had some wonderful learning experiences here! In addition to the beautiful stories that we could read about Easter, the children were also able to make their own Easter eggs and baskets from cardboard. We then put in two little real chocolate eggs for each child to enjoy. These were a real hit!

Korean and Chinese New Year – we had parents visit the kindy and teach the children about both the Korean and Chinese New Year. The children were able to dress in traditional Chinese and Korean clothing and experience the games, food and cultures. I think they loved eating the food that is made especially for the Chinese New Year.

Science in a Van – Emily from Science in a Van visited, bringing with her a range of bubble mixtures to create all sorts of bubbles using different shapes and strengths within the mixture. The children were enthralled with the size of the bubbles, and all got to try dipping the wands and shapes.

Lots of fun in the sandpit burying and finding different items, throwing soft, plastic balls onto the shade sails and watching to see where they would fall off, and creating huge towers using magnetic tiles. One morning, several children built a tower, with another child inside. We made a video and shared it with our families — lots and lots of laughter! The kids also created their own treaty by using tea bags to stain paper and a feather pen.

Our holiday programme at the end of term 1 also provided some cheerful enjoyment with the teachers engaging the children in baking and artwork and some hilarious videos of the kids just having heaps of fun. We have also started taking a small number of children to Mainly Music each week – this helps the children learn different songs and to be part of a wonderful group.

Term 2 sees us being in doors a little more with the weather, but any opportunities that allow the children to be outside are seized upon. The kids love the bikes in particular, and we really do have some possible athletes and gymnasts amongst our kids – they have amazing climbing and swinging skills on our outdoor equipment!

We hope you enjoy the below pictures; they make us smile and we hope they do the same for you.

From the Armchair - May 2021

In Matthew 7 v7, we read 'Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and it will be opened to you.'

My first understanding of this passage related to tangible, material things. However, over the years, I have realised that this passage is not about asking for ordinary things. It has nothing to do with asking or looking for a material possession.

Rather, I have come to believe that it is all about how we react to Jesus' call. If we ask Him to come into our lives, He will come. If we seek after Him we will find Him and if we knock on the door, He will open it and let us in. Traditionally, a church building was never locked. Anyone could enter at any time. In the same way, we can accept Jesus into our lives at any time. We don't even have to book an appointment.

I have also come to believe that once we have accepted Jesus into our lives, we are not alone and can ask for help at any time. Once again, it may not be material help. It may just be a sense that we can cope with the challenges that face us but it is help nevertheless. In a world where to be strong and confident is admired and where to show weakness is frowned upon, where body image is elevated to almost cult-like status, where we are faced with what may seem to be insurmountable health and climate-related issues, having that assurance that all we have to do is ask for help and it will be given to us is very comforting.

Sometimes it can be difficult to ask for help. We may feel that what is bothering us is not really important or that people will be too busy to respond to our request or that the request will be turned down but I have learned the validity of the saying 'nothing ventured, nothing gained'. As far as the passage from Matthew is concerned, taking a chance and accepting Jesus into your life will be worthwhile.

An example of how asking a question can have a very pleasant outcome comes from what a friend told me recently. They were faced with having to move a group of people from a venue in the city to the Ferry building in time for the ferry home. The distance was not far but members of the group were elderly and time was a little short. My friend asked at the desk at the entrance to the venue about public transport to the ferry. To her surprise, the staff chose to drive the group to the ferry so that instead of rushing, they were in plenty of time.

I need to remember that while I may often ask for help, there may be occasions where I am the one who is asked to help. In those situations, I should try to be like the staff at the venue and do more than is expected. That would be the least I could do.

Book Review

It was a typical damp lunch time in North London. A small. elderly woman entered an old. brick church in Islington. She settled in a pew at the front and took part in the service. It was a commemorative service marking 150 years since the inception of the Scripture Union movement. The lady had arrived by car, a flag flying on the front, had alighted onto the red carpet, been greeted by church officials, and conducted to her seat. She had no official part in the service but entered into every aspect of it. Her face is probably the most recognised in the world and she is Queen Elizabeth, Queen of England. Why was she here at this unimportant service? She is patron of Scripture Union and it holds a special place in her heart.

The book's author, Dudley
Delffs, is an American author
and English Professor, and has
spent much time in England

exploring his own Celtic roots. He was unable to talk to the queen but was able to speak to friends and associates. He draws a picture of a woman totally committed to her Christian faith & one who does not hesitate to speak of it in public when appropriate. The Christmas Broadcast always mentions the faith she holds and when she speaks following natural disasters, or tragedies such as accidents she never fails to invoke God's comfort and help to give people strength.

When she was crowned Queen, Elizabeth took on a role of life- long duty to the people of England but also to God. The Coronation Oath include commitment to uphold the laws of God and the true profession of the Gospel, as well as the laws of the land. Since then her life has been

governed by a deep sense of duty to her God and to the people of England and the commonwealth. She views that oath as binding because she vowed it before God.

I found this book enlightening as a look at the heart of a very private woman and her commitment to her saviour. Having read this I feel it is very unlikely that she would abdicate, as this would be breaking her oath. She may continue to step back, as she has been doing but I cannot see her abdicating. Her deep faith has given her great strength to live a life that has had its fair share of bad times, but I love the picture in the book of the Queen of England kneeling each night by her bed to say her prayers.

Kailakuri Health Centre, Bangladesh

In a February 2015 interview, six months before he passed away, Dr. Edric Baker, founder of the Kailakuri Heath Care Centre, said: "If this project does not become almost entirely Bangladeshi in terms of funding and in terms of medical supervision, I will consider that my life has been wasted..... I am sure that there are Bangladeshi doctors who are waiting to find a place like this, but so far they have not found it. Well, we want to find them!"

Six years later we can see Edric's dream of a Bangladeshi project coming true.

Kailakuri has become a fully registered and government sanctioned Bangladeshi Non-Government Organisation (NGO). Management and administration is being completely carried out by Bangladeshi staff. While Drs. Merindy and Jason Morgenson are home in the USA on furlough, medical oversight is being carried out by a Bangladeshi, Dr. Rishad, who on hearing of the need, volunteered to work at the centre while the Morgensons are away. This is a big breakthrough. In a country where 30% of the population is unable to access medical services, Kailakuri is seen as a beacon of light as a result of which local support is building up.

Pacific Pharmaceuticals Ltd., owned by a Bangladeshi family, is donating NZ\$6,000 of medicines per month free of charge. An Islamic bank donates blankets once a year. Groups of students are coming in and weeding the vegetable garden on a regular basis. The BNSB Mymensingh Eye Hospital come a couple of times a year and treat at no cost up to 1,000 locals with sight problems, including cataracts.


This month, one of the old tin sheds in-patient wards which was run down and badly needed repairs has been replaced with a new permanent materials building. This has been completely financed by the Bangladeshi branch of a Danish logistics and transportation company.

Meanwhile the health centre continues on as it always has, providing 'health services for the poor, by the poor'.

Edric's life was not wasted!







ST ANDREW'S BIG BAND 2011 - 2021

St Andrew's Big Band (SABB) held their first rehearsal in May 2011 with 18 musicians that had attended or were currently attending High Schools in the Eastern Suburbs of Auckland. Since then the band has grown in size and reputation with membership currently standing at 30 instrumentalists and 2 vocalists who continue to rehearse on Sunday evenings at 7pm in the Sanctuary at St Andrew's Church Centre. The band has built up a very loyal Supporters Club who have followed them to a number of concert venues and events including Harlequin Theatre, Uxbridge Theatre, Howick Little Theatre, All Saints Thursdays at Seven, Howick Midnight Madness. Rafters Music Club, Rainbow's End, Botany Town Centre Community Day and an annual appearance at the Howick Lions Senior Christmas Luncheon. SABB has also enjoyed staging special performances at the Monterey Theatre performing an opening set before the screening of classic movies such as "The Glenn Miller Story", "The Benny Goodman Story", "Rhapsody in Blue", "Meet Me in St Louis" and "The Blues Brothers".

SABB has also provided entertainment at many retirement villages and rest homes in the community including Pakuranga Park Village, Highlands Met-life Village, Dannemora Gardens, Bruce McLaren Retirement Village, Edmund Hillary Retirement Village, Selwyn Heights Village and Elmwood Village in Manurewa. These concerts are greatly appreciated by the residents, many of whom are unable to attend the public performances due to health and mobility reasons. At all of these performances the band collects donations from the audience that are then passed on to local and international charities. Since 2011 the band's public concerts and retirement village performances have raised over \$75,000 for organisations such as the YCDT, SPCA, Red Cross, Howick Coast Guard, The Family Centre Romania, NZ Leprosy Mission, Rainbow Youth, Limapela, Raukatauri Music Therapy Centre, Botany Downs Kindergarten, St Andrew's Foodbank, Fred Hollows Foundation, CanTeen, Dementia Auckland, Alzheimer's NZ, Auckland City Mission, Lifeline, Pillars, Cancer Society, Dove Hospice, Starship Hospital and the Eating Disorder Association of New Zealand.

Over the years SABB has been a training ground for aspiring musicians, many of whom have become professional musicians and music teachers. In recent years, some members have also begun to arrange music for the band and this has helped build up our music library that currently sits at over 80 pieces - all of which have been purchased courtesy of



sponsorship from audience and Supporters Club members. The most popular repertoire the band performs comes from the classic big band era of the 1930s and 1940s with artists such as Count Basie, Duke Ellington, Benny Goodman and Glenn Miller becoming cornerstones of every concert.

SABB is indebted to the support it receives from our very loyal audiences, the whanau and friends of our members, the HODs & Music Depts. of Howick College, Pakuranga College, Botany Downs Secondary College, Edgewater College, Selwyn College, Sancta Maria College as well as the Congregation & Elders at Howick Presbyterian Church.

Finally, I would like to thank my parents for encouraging me to pursue music teaching as a career; Zoe & Alex Arthur for helping me retain my youthful appearance, and Clare Robinson for encouraging me to form the band back in 2011 and pushing me out the door to rehearsal every Sunday night.

David Stewart

David Stewart was born in Bannockburn, Scotland in 1927. His family owned a long-standing joinery business. David served his apprenticeship in the 1940s and later become a master joiner taking over the business in his late 20s. He expanded the business to provide a full range of trades and undertook some very large contracts over many years.

As a young man, David's life was consumed by rugby at the local Stirling

County Rugby Club. He became Captain and played on occasions for Glasgow. He also curled, playing against teams from Canada and USA and reached the quarter-finals of the UK Championships.

David met Ethel in 1953 and a few months later they married. He was well known in the local press who's headlines included "Rugby Player Weds" and "Who will take over now as Stirling's most eligible bachelor".

David and Ethel had 3 sons. One of whom, Robin, died in a tragic accident in 1960. A challenging time, but supported by family and friends they moved on. They had a very close relationship with the Minister of the Allan Church at the time and were active in fund-raising and social events which helped.

They were very keen overseas travellers, holidaying in Europe every year and until eventually buying a villa in Spain in the early 70s. At home, they moved to Dunblane in 1971. Again they developed a large group of friends and became active supporters of Dunblane Cathedral, with whom they have kept in contact throughout.

In 1989, David and Ethel moved to Spain and lived an idyllic lifestyle for 12 years before eventually moving back to UK. That didn't last long though, as in 2001 they decided to move to New Zealand where their son David and his family had been living since the late 80s.

On arrival in New Zealand, they enjoyed a wonderful life with family, travelling around the country, and meeting many new friends at the Howick Presbyterian Church. Ethel volunteered at the Op Shop and David undertook gardening and other tasks for many years. Their involvement in the Church meant so much to them.

In the last few years David saw the arrival of 8 great grandchildren and enjoyed some lovely holidays with 4 generations travelling together.

David was diagnosed with Cancer 3 years ago and given a few months to live. But as usual, his determination and positive thinking just put it to the side and even since Ethel passed away a couple of years ago he stayed strong and fit, walking every day and taking up and loving bowls.

Launch Pad

Our name - Launchpad comes from the idea that we are giving the children a firm foundation of Godly values from which to launch into life with all its ups and downs.

We have started at Mellons Bay School this term with a full team, of 11 presenters/teachers sharing the Launchpad programme with 262 students from y3-y6. They have put a lot of time into producing our teacher and pupil workbooks - being paid for by the YCDT. Thank you.

Please keep praying for us as many of you do especially on Thursday mornings at 9 - 9.40 a.m. We need your prayers. Also pray for the staff. Helen Eastabrook as the National School coordinator, BOT, CEO; Geoff Burdon, big and small group Presenters and that churches will be positive and supportive with finances and people.

There is waiting list in the country, for schools willing to have the program, but no volunteers to fill the vacancies. School chaplains are needed too.
